NEW EXAMINING METHODS AND PROCEDURES

A. All papers were examined by three-hour timed written in-person exams in Examination Schools. The European and World History papers were typed directly into Inspera, as the politics papers have been since 2023. Classification procedures were the same as in 2019, pre-pandemic.

B. Candidates were informed directly by email in April and May 2024 detailing the examination methods and procedures.

Part II

A. GENERAL COMMENTS ON THE EXAMINATION

49 students sat the examination. 18 received Distinctions (seven women and eleven men).

MCE Applications – 3 MCE notices were received. No adjustment to marks was made in 2 of these cases; in one case the mark of one paper was disregarded, and an adjustment was made.

B. EQUALITY AND DIVERSITY ISSUES AND BREAKDOWN OF THE RESULTS BY GENDER

The results by gender continue to be a cause for concern; there are now no years in the last five (omitting 2020) where women have had as high a percentage of distinctions as men. While in any individual year the numbers are small, over these years in total n=232 (113M 119F). Taking that period as a whole we get the following results:

These seem to indicate a large gap in attainment at Distinction level (more than 15%). History & Politics committee should continue to consider this issue. More positively, the 2024 results at least show a smaller than average gap after three years of more than 20% gaps.
