## European and World History

The core lecture circuits for European and World History in the Final Honour School take place in different terms depending on the period option studied.

## Additional Lectures

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### **Attendance for Non-members of the University**

Non-members of the University who are not otherwise exempted<sup>1</sup>, may not attend university lectures (unless they are detailed under 'Special Lectures' or announced as open to the general public), except by prior agreement of the department or faculty concerned.

The department or faculty may charge a fee for attendance. The level of fee is a matter for departmental discretion. A lecturer may for personal reasons occasionally admit a person to his or her own lecture or lectures without a fee. The department or faculty may refuse the right of attendance to any person or category of person for whatever reason. They may at any time withdraw the right to attendance, and any lecturer may exclude a person from his or her lectures without reason given; in either case the department shall determine what proportion (if any) of any fee paid shall be refunded. Attendance at lectures given in any college building shall be subject to the right of the college concerned to refuse admission.

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<sup>1</sup> *The following non-members are exempted, i.e. they may attend university lectures advertised in lecture lists: students whose names are entered on the Register of Diploma students, or the Register of Recognised Students, or the Register of Visiting Students; and, when space permits, non-members of the University who are university or college employees.*

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
